

Hall of Fame Horse Gone to Greener Pastures

Many Ride & Tiers of long standing will remember the remarkable horse, Grey, who died peacefully out at pasture on October 6 at the age of 32. Grey was absolutely atypical for an endurance horse. He was a catch-colt by a Morgan stallion out of an unnamed, unbroke Percheron mare and he stood 16 hands. He went on to become a Ride & Tie Hall of Fame horse.

We first saw him thundering across the finish line at the 1975 R&T near Paso Robles, where he and his team finished second and he took the Best Condition award. We were thoroughly impressed and were determined to find out if there were any more like him where he came from. He came from a cattle ranch in Alturas, California, and there were no more like him – but the rancher told us he would sell the original model. We're convinced the rancher laughed all the way to the bank with the \$1200 selling price. We felt we had made a bargain purchase. Grey was 9 years old at the time, and he proved his worth to us for 23 more years.

Grey worked cattle, flagged trail, top tenned innumerable endurance rides, placed fourth on the Tevis, was a consummate actor, and won the



Levi's Ride & Tie in 1977 at Point Reyes. The \$1250 award money that was Grey's share more than paid for him. He was a great teacher and mentor for many Ride & tiers, some of whom are still competing.

He was laid to rest under an oak tree on Big Creek Ranch next to the

trail used by the Castle Rock 50-mile endurance ride. We will place a granite boulder and bronze plaque there so that he will never be forgotten by the participants of the sport in which he excelled.

President's Message

Hello everyone. Steve Shaw, Maryann Buxton (the 1999 Championship Race Director), and I went to Klamath Falls recently to look at the 1999 race site. We met with Tim Kerns, the local race coordinator (who couldn't have been more helpful) and the race site host, Cameron Curtis. He and his wife, Jennie, are great, and they have a beautiful ranch, called The Rock Creek.

This is where the camp and start/finish will be. It's about 30 minutes from town and about 10 minutes from the Running Y Resort. The Resort is lovely and has room for those who don't like camping! It is situated next to Klamath Lake and has an 18-hole golf course, a gym, a small store, and a restaurant.

The camp site is on what was an old town. It has a large treed area that will provide us with a central gathering area, a large meadow for our favorite type of "whoop it up" start and easy to see finish, and 35-40 miles of cloverleafed trail. The course will be over private land and will be laid out initially by Cam Curtis and his new ranch foreman, Ron Kelly.

Some of you may remember Ron. He's an old Ride & Tier who was, in fact, second at our first Klamath Falls

race and second at the 1975 Paso Robles event. What a surprise to find him here!

Rock Creek Ranch is across the road and Cam will rent out paddock space on a first-come, first-served basis for those who wish to stay at the resort or who do not wish to have their horses in the main camp.

It was snowing when we were there, so we didn't see the trail, but we plan to return in March or April and go over it. They say there is no worry about snow in July (famous last words) since the altitude for the race will only be 4,000 to 5,000 feet. So far, I think it will be a combination of ranch and logging roads and off-road trail. We're counting Ron and Cam to lay out a challenging course. I'll keep you posted as we learn more about it.

I think we're going to have a great event this year and I encourage you to bring some new folks along. There is a lot of enthusiasm in the local area for the race, and I think we'll get some new teams from that area as well. I'll keep you posted as we learn more about the course and gather more details about the area. Until then, my best wishes to you and your families.

The 29th annual Easyboot Ride & Tie Championship will be held July 10 at the Rock Creek Ranch at the site of the old Powerhouse (still in operation) just out of Klamath Falls, Oregon on Highway 140. The Running Y Ranch and Rock Creek Ranch are co-hosting the event this year and it promises to be one of the most challenging and fun weeks.

You are all invited to share the base camp for that week and ride the 40 miles of pre-marked trails overlooking the lake. Come share in the week-long activities and sights near Crater Lake.

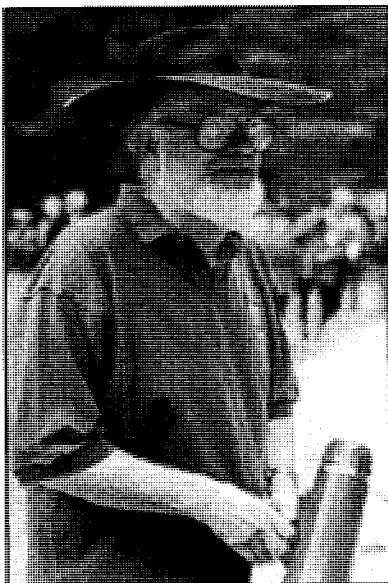
Base camp is at the site of an old ghost town just 1/2 mile off the highway. Water is easily available at the camp and miles and miles of riding on over 52,000 acres is accessible. Those not participating in the race can come and camp and ride this week for no charge (but be careful around us sweet-talking ride & tiers or we'll have you entered before you know it!)

Camp and trails open on July 4th weekend. There is a "surprise" party on Wednesday, Potluck on Thursday, and a RAT Race on Saturday. Racers get a free banquet, though tickets will be available for purchase for guests and non-competitors. A Shriners Mule Camp will be held that same week and they will be providing the meal on Saturday.

The Ride & Tie Association has acquired one of the entries to the entire 2001 XP and will offer any of the "DAYS

ON THE TRAIL" to anyone who wants to ride & tie the day. It will only cost \$25 per person. Some horses will be provided. International enthusiasts are encouraged to try a day. For more information, contact Mary Tiscornia, association president (the association numbers are on the cover of this newsletter, and also in the masthead).

At the Cuyamaca Ride & Tie, Garret Ford (owner of Easyboot) was first place with his partner from Idaho, Christoph Shork. Their horse, Exitor, also won Best Condition. Ride & Tiers Kick Butt at the Almaden Triathlon

Following a four year absence the Almaden Triathlon took place on October 17, 1998. Divisions offered included Team & Ironperson All Male, All Female & co-ed. Seven Solo competitors started with 12 teams. After a quick start by Rick Anderson, Chris Turney and Dan Barger hunted him down as the hills got steeper. By the end Dan had the fastest running time of the day in 53:22 with Chris finishing in 54:08. Dan and Chris would later reveal their plans to team up as ride & tie partners for the 1999 season. You've been warned!

Ross Doyal held the lead on the bike section and hand off to Bob Spoor. The team of Barger/Doyal & Spoor would end up slipping to fourth overall while Anderson/Parod & Andreotti would bring the win home in a time of 2:48:21. Suzanne Andreotti would also have the fastest horse split of the day.

In the Ironperson division Mark Falcone won in 3:14:11. Rumor through the grapevine is that Mark will be getting involved in Adventure Racing, which is a new sport for the next millennium. Adventure Racing is a team sport involving mountain running, Mt. Biking, kayaking all while using topo maps to find checkpoints along the route. Michelle Andreotti was second overall and 1st woman in 3:27:22.


